Key Findings

- Reviewed and updated 30 management plans.
- Developed five new management plans for sites acquired since 2012.

Introduction

Alberta Conservation Association (ACA) conducts various activities through the Land Management Program aimed at conserving, protecting and enhancing wildlife and fish habitat and increasing sustainable recreational opportunities, particularly hunting and angling. One activity of the program is management of ACA Conservation Sites on Crown and titled land. We manage Conservation Sites on behalf of the Crown, in which the original investment was made via the Buck for Wildlife program and administered by Alberta Environment and Sustainable Resource Development. We also manage sites that we hold sole or partial title to, which were secured via our Habitat Securement Fund or our Corporate Partners Program or were donated to ACA by individuals.

Management plan development is an essential aspect of effectively managing our conservation assets. Management plans define the vision, goals and features of the site and identify

responsibilities of the project partners. Emphasis is placed on developing detailed habitat management objectives that maintain the ecological integrity of the Conservation Site and provide complementary recreational opportunities.

Once a new acquisition is secured, ACA works with partners to develop a management plan for the Conservation Site. Once finalized, ACA and our partners review and update the plan as required or on a term basis (e.g., after five years) to ensure that we are delivering on the goals and activities identified in the plan.

Methods

First, we prioritize Conservation Sites for management plan development as follows:

- 1. New acquisitions requiring a management plan.
- 2. Sites that require extensive or immediate revisions.
- 3. All other sites requiring updates (i.e., have not been revised within the term period).

Second, we develop management plans using the following steps:

- 1. ACA identifies all partners required to develop or review the management plan and meets with partners to discuss the goals, restrictions and responsibilities that will be identified in the management plan.
- 2. ACA writes a draft of the management plan using a standardized management plan template and process.
- 3. ACA reviews the draft management plans for provincial consistency and submits the draft to partners for review until all partners are satisfied with the plan.
- 4. ACA finalizes the management plan and forwards it to partners for approval and signing.
- 5. ACA ensures that copies of the signed management plan are kept regionally and forwards copies to the appropriate government officials, partners, and to the ACA executive assistant (corporate office).

Prioritizing and developing the management plans is coordinated regionally.

Results

We developed five new management plans for sites secured since 2012 (Table 1) and reviewed and updated 30 management plans (Table 2).
